His experience at The American Opportunity Foundation, Inc., involved leading affordable workforce housing acquisition and investment activities. And while at Fannie Mae, he led a number of initiatives, with one in particular at Fannie Mae's American Communities Fund. There he led debt and equity investments for neighborhood housing development for the Mid-Atlantic and Southeast.

Alan holds a Bachelor of Arts in Banking & Finance from Morehouse College, an MBA from The Goizueta Business School at Emory University, and a Master of Science in Real Estate from the J. Mack Robinson School of Business at Georgia State University. ### 40 homes in 40 years

In the coming year, we have much to celebrate. Since our start in 1983, nearly 40 years ago, Atlanta Habitat has worked diligently with more than 6,000 family members dedicated to achieving the dream of affordable homeownership.

Though the pandemic affected Atlanta Habitat in many of the same ways as other nonprofit organizations, we pivoted in the moment and continued to empower our families and build affordable homes throughout Atlanta.

As our 40 year anniversary approaches, we are excited to think about how our programs have expanded over the years to accomplish our mission. In addition to the first-time homebuyer program, our neighborhood revitalization efforts now include critical home repairs (Repair with Kindness), paint and light aesthetic repair services (Brush with Kindness) and homeowner education and financial literacy programs.

When we reached our 30-year anniversary in 2013, we began to see our impact take on a long-lasting effect. Our homeowners began paying off their mortgages. In the last seven years, over 120 Atlanta Habitat homeowners have completely paid off their homes.

When we envision Atlanta Habitat's legacy for the city, it looks similar to a happy homeowner paying off their mortgage and having a home to pass on to their family. For our 40th anniversary in 2023, how could we celebrate four decades of being a leader in affordable housing? We plan to build 40 homes for our 40th year. Even after two challenging years, working our way back to

pre-pandemic production, there is no better time than our 40th anniversary to build more and do more.

It will take the support of our entire Atlanta Habitat community to make this possible and continue pushing our mission forward. Whether volunteering, donating or being a champion of the mission, your time and effort will make a bigger impact than ever before. ## thank you state of Georgia!

Atlanta Habitat is thrilled to receive a \$1 million award from the State of Georgia's Fiscal Recovery Fund – Negative Economic Impact grant. The Negative Economic Impact grant was created to help individuals and organizations in Georgia that have suffered economic harm from the COVID-19 pandemic. Thirty-three organizations were awarded grants and Atlanta Habitat is the only housing organization to receive funding.

Atlanta Habitat struggled through 2020 and 2021 but

we were able to continue to help families in critical need thanks to our loyal supporters, strong leadership, and dedicated staff. This new funding will support new home builds, home repairs, financial literacy and homeowner education, career and entrepreneurship scholarships, and much-needed mortgage relief for our homeowners impacted by the pandemic and other unforeseen crisis. We are grateful to Georgia and Governor Kemp for this opportunity to serve more families in need in Atlanta and in South Fulton.

### giving the gift of home

Purchasing a home can change the trajectory of a family for generations. It provides security, opportunity and a connection to the community. Congratulations to Bruce and Janet! And a special thank you to all our volunteers who continue to be the heart of Atlanta Habitat.




### preparing your home for fall

At Atlanta Habitat, we are creating opportunities for our homeowners to learn how to develop generational wealth. Home ownership can lead to greater economic stability and growth within a homeowner's own household - not only for themselves but also for their children and grandchildren.

As our homeowners learn about investing to help create generational wealth, they can follow these tried-andtrue guidelines of investing from Katie Gatti Tassin, who recommends a "buy and hold" method of investing. Ignoring the nervousness and not reacting sporadically to a down market, but letting your investments have time to grow, could benefit you as an investor in the long run.

- 1. Set aside the right amount of cash for emergencies so that you won't feel the need to pull money out of investments.
- 2. Instead of measuring your investing success by dollars gained or lost, and watching the numbers fluctuate up and down, measure your success by the number of shares you own.
- 3. Some of the worst days in the market are closely followed by the best days. So don't make investing decisions based on the worst days because the best days are sometimes right around the corner.

## thriving in academic and professional development

At Atlanta Habitat, we believe in building lasting relationships with our homeowners and families and helping them achieve their next dreams and life goals. Our Vision. Goals, Action! (VGA) program was one of the first manifestations of our "beyond the build" strategy. VGA programs provide scholarships for academic and professional advancement. Whether someone wants to start a new business, return to school or learn a new skill, we help support and encourage along the way. In the past, only our homeowners and their children could participate but now, with our *My Money. My Future*. (MMMF) program, two individuals outside of our first-time homebuyer program will receive scholarships.

The academic scholarships go directly toward educational advancement for homeowners currently enrolled in universities. These funds are disbursed directly to their colleges and universities to help cover some tuition and other school fees. This year, Atlanta Habitat will award over \$30,000 in academic scholarship funds including awards to

MMMF participants. To date, Atlanta Habitat has awarded six individuals academic scholarships with one award going to a MMMF participant. This year, five of the academic awards were presented to the children of our homeowners while the remaining award went to an aspiring homeowner in the MMMF program, Denisha, to support her Master's Program.

In addition to the academic awards, two recipients – one from MMMF – were granted a total of scholarships for professional development. These scholarships can fund any part of professional development, from real estate license classes to licensure exams to needed computer equipment.

We are so proud of all of our winners and so thankful to our generous *My Money. My Future.* donors, Bank OZK, Regions Bank, The State of Georgia, and The Home Depot Foundation for their continued support for our homeowners, their children and aspiring homeowners in the MMMF program.

## beautifying the community with habi-gardens

Our Atlanta Habitat families are more than homeowners. They are also people who are deeply invested in the communities where they live. During homeownership education classes, Atlanta Habitat homeowners are taught and encouraged to participate in community involvement of all kinds. We also encourage beautifying the place and area where most of us spend the most time, our homes. This is why if you happen to ride by a Habitat house, you may notice a colorful addition – a "Habi-Garden."

Recently, our homeowners participated in a Habi-Garden contest to show off their gardening skills at their homes. Contestants were judged based on factors such as appeal, creativity, plant health, layout and community engagement. We received multiple applications and had four winners. Among them was our grand prize winner, Clarissa. "My garden is my serenity. It gives me a calming peace not only when I'm planting, but when

I water the garden and when I stand back to look at them," said Clarissa of her gardening experience. We are grateful to see our homeowners embrace the areas they live in and look forward to seeing the beautiful gardens our homeowners come up with next.





### growing our impact

At Atlanta Habitat, we have been fortunate to be part of an incredible journey for over 6,000 family members. Because we have committed to going beyond the build, there is no telling just how far our impact will go in the years to come.

What we do know, however, is that we have had over 150 homeowners pay off their mortgages, 83% of our homeowners report being better off financially, and a higher success rate of children finishing school and pursuing higher education. Over 200 participants have completed our My Money. My Future. program to prepare them financially for homeownership with or without participating in our program. As you can see from the infographic, even with all the successes with our homeowners, entrepreneurs, aspiring college students and even those preparing for homeownership, we have truly only scratched the surface of the need we are faced with each year. There is so much work still to be done in the city of Atlanta.

With the incredible amount of support we have received this year, we are often asked,

"what's next?" Our answer is simple. What is next is that we do more. Even with the significant impact we have already made, the housing crisis is still on the rise. According to the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, housing in Atlanta is officially unaffordable - with the median price of a home topping at \$430,000 in May of 2022. Not only are homes unaffordable, but they are also currently in short supply. The need for affordable housing has never been so great.

We are in a position to have some of the most impactful years in the history of the organization but we cannot do it without you. As we approach our 40th year, this is our time to make effective change together in the city we all know and love. This is the time to ensure that our teachers, police officers, nurses and others in the workforce are in the position to take advantage of homeownership opportunities. In this year to come, we hope to have your support as we remain leaders in affordable housing, financial literacy and educational opportunities related to homeownership across the city of Atlanta.



## establishing the foundation of homeownership



At Atlanta Habitat, when we stand on the steps and porches of the homes of our homeowners with children, we know from that moment on we are watching them change lives for generations to come. Statistics show that children are 15% more likely to become homeowners when their parents are homeowners. Although it has gone unnoticed over time, studies show that the lack of neighborly outreach can lessen our quality of life.

Knowing others in your community can help you feel safer overall when living in your home. Even when you are away from home, it can help to have neighbors volunteering to keep an eye on your home.

At Atlanta Habitat, we have seen firsthand the benefits of our new homeowners bonding with one another as they build their homes side by side. Not only do they feel more secure, but they also make new friends for themselves and their children as well.

"I love hearing kids playing and having fun together. I can't wait to see the friends my grandchildren will make with other



kids in this neighborhood," said Kaneesia during a recent event at Atlanta Habitat's newest workforce housing development, Browns Mill Village.

Browns Mill Village will eventually be home to 75 new Atlanta Habitat families that all have the opportunity to grow into their homeownership journey together and support each other as neighbors.
